No firm decisions were made other than no subcommittees were set up because all were keen to be involved in some way with the various activities.



SHOWCASE OF LEARNING AT ST AIDAN'S


We welcomed many, many parents and grandparents to the classrooms today. The learning on display was spectacular and the students were extremely proud to show their work and learning spaces.

Numeracy News

Growth points are learning statements that show what your child could do in the interview and indicate the next step in their learning.

COUNTING GROWTH POINTS

0	Not yet able to count to 20.		
1	I can rote count to 20 correctly.		
2	I can count a collection of about 20 objects and recall the number 1 more and 1 less.		
3	I can count forwards and backwards from 0-100.		
4	I can count by 2s, 5s and 10s from zero to a given target.		
5	I can count by 2s, 5s and 10s from a non-zero number		
6	I can count from any non-zero number by any single digit. I can apply counting to practical situations.		
7	I can count by fractions and decimals.		

How can I support my child with their counting goal?

- -Count with your child EVERY DAY!
- -Use materials to help your child to count if needed.
- -Encourage your child to listen to themselves when they count and correct themselves if necessary. Eg. record and listen to themselves on an ipad.
- -Get your child to count money and calculate change. Eg. How much change would I get if I had \$5.

The purpose of Lent:

As we journey once again toward the cross, we strip ourselves of the distractions and distances we have placed between ourselves, God, others, and creation. During Lent, we empty and open ourselves so we can draw ever closer to the one we seek.

Young children learn through their feelings. Focus on feelings of love, kindness, and generosity, and take special care to avoid feelings of guilt.

Older children understand responsible choices, being kind to others, and taking care of the Earth.

Youth are learning what it means to be a member of a global community. They will understand issues of social justice and how they can make a difference in the world.

Everyone's journey is unique, and everyone will respond to the practices in different ways. The following suggestions may be helpful with children and youth.

Fasting: Focus on Responsible Choices and making time and space for God.

Prayer of Reflection: Review each day. When did you receive love? When did you share love?

Holy attention: Encourage family members to focus on a friend in need or the country upheld in the Daily Prayer for Peace

Q: Why are Sundays excluded from the reckoning of the forty days?





ST Aidan's Primary School Sacramental Program

Dear Parent/Guardian

The Sacrament of Penance, also referred to as 'Reconciliation', is the Sacrament of healing and is the second Sacrament for those baptised within the Catholic Church. The School Reconciliation Workshops will take place on **Thursday 2nd March at 3:30pm until 4:15pm.**Mrs Miray Khoury, the Religious Education Coordinator supported by the staff of the school, will facilitate the Reconciliation Workshops to be held in the Year 6 classrooms. The Workshops will run for 45 minutes and involve you and your child talking and working together to learn more about the Sacrament of Reconciliation in your family, in Scripture and in the Church. Students preparing for the Sacrament, along with at least one of their parents, need to attend all of the workshops.

- The Sacramental Program is about the School and Parish supporting you in preparing your child/children for receiving the gifts and graces of the Sacraments as they journey through their Christian life.
- As members of the community of Saint Aidan's Primary School, Rooty Hill we are all called to support and assist each other with developing our faith. We all have gifts and talents, which enrich this special time of preparation for our children. The preparation touches us too as we reflect and look at Christ's teachings in different ways and from a different perspective, through the lens of our children.
- Parents and carers are not expected to 'know it all' and as lifelong learners we are at different stages in understanding our faith. The Sacramental Programme gives families a chance to share, reflect, listen, learn, interact with others, be enriched, and develop a greater understanding about ourselves and the presence of God in our lives while being supported by others.

EVERY LEARNER, EVERY DAY and is our school slogan for 2017. It is our combined responsibility to have our children at school every day and on time.

Our school needs your help to improve this level. Please remember to plan holidays in the school holidays not during the school term. Incentives for 100% attendance are now in place. Students have received an attendance sheet that is stamped each week if they have been at school. The children receive a sticker if they have been at school with 100% attendance after five weeks and a certificate at the end of the term for 100% attendance.

Learning at St Aidan's

This year our goal for literacy is <u>improving student reading comprehension</u>. Many students can read accurately but may not understand what they have read or can talk about what they have read. If this occurs the classroom or group teacher will often keep the student at an easier levelled reader to gain the comprehension required.

Comprehension strategies that students need to use to be successful are:

- Making Connections
- · Predicting and hypothesising
- Questioning
- Visualising
- · Identifying the writer's purpose and point of view
- · Identifying the main idea
- Summarising
- Analysing and synthesising ideas
- · Evaluating ideas and information
- Inferring

How can parents help with their child's comprehension skills?

Making connections - talk about the book. Connect book with similar stories they may have read.

<u>Predicting and hypothesising</u>- ask your child what they think the book is about and why did they answer that way. It is about getting children to look and observe as much as they can see.

Questioning- ask lots of questions before, during and after reading. It is only when children are reflecting that comes understanding.

<u>Visualising</u>- close your eyes and see what is happening in the story. Once mastered they don't even need to close their eyes as they already have the picture of the story unfolding before them.

<u>Identifying the author's purpose</u>- every writer writes for a purpose, such as to entertain or inform, and specific audience. Can you help your child to find the author's purpose in the books you read with them and the book they bring home to read?

<u>Identifying the main idea</u>- what is the one theme of the book? Talk to your child using the correct terminology as this is used in the classroom.

<u>Summarising</u>- being able to retell or recount main points of the story not just a one word answer or one sentence answer. The more your child can talk about the book the deeper the comprehension or understanding.

<u>Inferring</u>- what is the author not saying straight out but giving the reader clues- eg, the boy put on his coat before he walked out of the house. Our inferring would be that the boy was walking out into the cold and needed to keep warm while outside. These skills are required for all good readers.




